Transition year refers to an optional educational year in secondary schools offered in the Irish educational system. The main purpose of a transition year is to provide students with an opportunity to explore various subjects, skills, and experiences outside the regular curriculum.

It is designed to promote personal development, self-confidence, and independence. During this year, students may engage in activities such as working with the enneagram, gaisce and community service, genealogy and family history, ICT and scratch, media and rapping, zoology, teaching English as a foreign language, cookery course, neuroscience and the brain, Plato, Vedanta and Comparative religion, food and well-being: Conscious consumption and Microbiology and the spread of disease.
